

ECE groups get in the swim

Early Childhood swim groups go swimming six times each week. The ages of the groups range from infant to pre-school student. All of these classes are individualized for the particular age group and level of swim experience.

Infant and toddler programs tend to focus on water exploration, swim skill preparation, peer modeling and

imitating the movements of blow-up animals, such as jumping like a frog, or blowing bubbles like a fish. Students are directed to try these activities through songs that encourage some level of independence. Toddler programs are fun-filled and focus on safety. Each child has one-on-one supervision. Mascot Mr. Otter helps

children learn swim skills and swim safely through his very own song.

The pre-school swim program also employs Mr. Otter to lead such activities as getting wet, blowing bubbles, using alternating arm movements, leg movements, going under, and jumping into the water. The program focuses on safety rules such as using walking feet, never swimming alone, only swimming with a lifeguard on duty, and learning safe rescue techniques, such as "throw, don't go," which encourages children to throw a floating object to a distressed swimmer, as opposed to the child entering the water themselves.

The aquatics staff would like to extend a heartfelt "thank you" to all teachers, therapists and family members who get in the water and help students enjoy their time at the pool. Without this help, all of the benefits of the swim program would not be possible.

Special Olympics founder to turn 86

Eunice Kennedy Shriver, a lifelong advocate for people with developmental disabilities and founder of Special Olympics, will celebrate her 86th birthday on July 10th.

She is still working on a daily basis, serving as Honorary Chairperson of Special Olympics and Executive Vice President of the Joseph P. Kennedy, Jr. Foundation.

Mrs. Shriver was the fifth of nine children in her famous family. Growing up, she had a strong interest in sports and a strong affection for her sister, Rosemary, who was born with mental retardation.

The first Special Olympics games were held in Chicago in 1968,

however, the roots of the program go back to 1962 when Mrs. Shriver learned of difficulties faced by parents in attempting to enroll their children in summer camp - - children with mental retardation were routinely excluded. She decided to open her home to help.

A family tradition of providing a free summer camp at the Shriver estate in Rockville, Maryland, was begun. The original camp served 35 local children. Today Special Olympics serves over 2.5 million people in 165 countries.

In 1984, President Ronald Reagan awarded Mrs. Shriver the Medal of Freedom, the nation's highest civilian award, in recognition of her work on behalf of people with disabilities.

FCBMRDD Superintendent Jed Morison worked with Special Olympics in the 1970s, helping to set up programs in Belgium and Brazil. He vividly recalls Mrs. Shriver: "Mrs. Shriver is a strong, visionary leader who is very practical in her approach. She is incredibly committed to helping people with disabilities."

Mrs. Shriver is no stranger to Franklin County. In 1987, she visited here for 2 days as part of a tour of Special Olympics programs.

Did you know?
