Helen Ninos elected board president



The Franklin County Board of Development Disabilities has a new leader. Helen Ninos was elected president of the board at its organizational meeting on January 21st.

Appointed to the board by the Franklin County Commissioners in 2006, she has previously served as Vice-President and Chairwoman of the Human Resources Committee.

Ms. Ninos is employed as the Chief Operating Officer for Human Resources of the Ohio Attorney General's Office. An attorney, she previously was Chief of Staff of the Columbus City Attorney's Office, and Chief Operating Officer for United Way of Central Ohio.

Ms. Ninos resides in Gahanna with her husband, Michael Underwood, who is also an attorney. They have three children: Patrick, Katy and Colleen.

Ms. Ninos is only the fourth woman to lead the board since its creation in 1967.

Other officers elected on January 21st are Dean Fadel, Vice-President, and Galen Stover, Secretary.

Frank New to end epic career_____

Having completed 18 years with the agency and a total of 48 years of public service, Frank New, FCBDD's Director of Planning, will retire at the end of the month.

"I never expected to work this long," he said. "I'm very blessed that I did."

"This is a very fine organization," he added. "I'm grateful to have been associated with it."

Frank was familiar with FCBDD even before coming to work for the agency in 1992. As an official with the Ohio Department of Education in the 1970s and 1980s, he noticed that "one county board sort of stood out in Ohio."

"Franklin County had it together," he recalled. "If people were doing good things, if they were on the cutting edge, it was in Franklin County."

So he was "intrigued" when, after retiring as state Director of Special Education, he was asked by then FCBDD Superintendent Steve Pleasnick to come aboard.

As Director of Planning, Frank's duties have been wideranging and have included overseeing relations with the agency's collaborative partners, strategic planning, coordinating *Managing for Results*, emergency planning and special projects. He also headed the annual Community Star Awards program.

Asked to identify the most notable change during his career, he replied, "The expansion of services ... it is amazing to see how far we've come."

Asked to identify his most notable achievement, Frank declined. "I never got caught up in individual achievements. Everything that's happened is a result of a team effort ... a lot of great people working together."

Superintendent Jed Morison commented: "Frank has made an invaluable contribution to our agency. His experience, dedication and leadership skills were a perfect match for what we needed. He will certainly be missed."

Frank began public service in 1962 as a teacher for the Cincinnati Public

Schools. He had earned a bachelor's degree in secondary education from Thomas More College where he majored in English, French and Latin.

He joined the Ohio Department of Education in 1968 after earning a master's degree in education administration from the University of Cincinnati. He led the Division of Special Education during challenging times.

In 2007, he was honored as an Ohio Pioneer in Education by the State Board of Education. Then Superintendent of Public Instruction Dr. Susan Tave Zelman described Frank as "a person whose name is almost synonymous with special education in Ohio."

In retirement, Frank looks forward to spending leisure time with his wife Lois, daughters Kristen and Karen, son-in-law Jay, grandson Matthew and granddaughters Stacey, Melissa and Emily.

He plans to complete some household chores including building cabinets for the laundry room. He will visit Italy in May and Africa "at some point."

We wish Frank the very best in his well-deserved retirement.

Transportation Department sponsors a 'Golden Crockpot' award and the Living Skills Centers' created their own 'Iron Skillet' award.




Special Olympics bowlers are on a roll
