Franklin County Board to get 5-year accreditation

The Franklin County Board of Developmental Disabilities (FCBDD) has received word from the Ohio Department of Developmental Disabilities (DODD) that it will receive accreditation for five years as a result of the recent review of board programs and services conducted by DODD. That is the longest accreditation period the state offers for county boards.

A team of DODD surveyors visited FCBDD from January 28th through 30th. All board programs and services were reviewed other than those which fall under the jurisdiction of the Ohio Department of Education.

"We're thrilled to receive this positive recognition of the quality of services provided," said FCBDD Superintendent Jed Morison. "It is a great credit to our staff and their strong commitment to their work."

Included in DODD's review were FCBDD's role as a provider of Early Intervention Services for the "Help Me Grow" program, its role as a direct provider of Medicaid Waiver Services, Adult Services, and Transportation Services, and its separate and independent role as Service Coordinator and Local Medicaid Administrative Authority for Waiver Services.

The new accreditation period will run from June 1st to May 31, 2019.

Project managers for the accreditation review were Tracey Crawford and Larry Macintosh of the Administrative and Support Services Department and Karin Crabbe of Service Coordination.

Beautiful Natural Life wins Best in Show by Lorena Loaiza

VSA Ohio inspires and encourages people with disabilities to express themselves through the arts. Since 1996, the Accessible Expressions Art Exhibit has given artists the opportunity to create, exhibit and sell their work. The exhibit travels throughout Ohio through December.

Christine Brown speaks at DD awareness, advocacy program

Franklin County was well represented at the state's annual DD Awareness and Advocacy kick-off held at the Statehouse Atrium on March 4th. A large contingent from the county attended and self-advocate Christine Brown was one of eight speakers to address the audience of over 400.

She called on state lawmakers to increase the Medicaid Asset Limit, noting that the limit of \$1,500 has remained the same for forty years. The only Medicaid recipients subject to this asset limit are those falling under the aged, blind or disabled (ABD) program.

Other speakers at the kick-off included John Martin, Director of the Department of Developmental Disabilities, and Renee Ward of the Ohio Developmental Disabilities Council.

Students learn how to use iPad by Michael Ross

Students at West Central and Northeast Schools are learning how to use the iPad with Bluetooth and adapted switches. Switch accessibility is a type of assistive technology that enables people with physical or cognitive disabilities to access an iPad. There are a wide variety of switches as well as many different ways to activate them. However, a switch cannot be directly plugged into an iPad. In order to use a switch, one must have switch interfaces, which bridge the connection between the switch and the iPad.

The switch in use currently is the Bluetooth cordless switch interface from RJ Cooper. It works through Bluetooth settings on the iPad and has a range of over 50 feet. This allows the user to use any app on the iPad that is switch accessible.

Three options are built into the iPad and iPod under accessibility. One can choose from using the



screen as a switch, using head movement or an external switch. Here, Ashley Marshall, a senior-level student in a collaborative classroom at Central Crossing High School, is using her head switch connected to Bluetooth to scan through songs in her music library. She then uses her hand to select the song she wants.

Children go for gold at ECE Olympics

Although the 2014 Winter Olympics were held in Sochi, Russia, the children attending FCBDD's Early Childhood program didn't have far to travel to get in on the fun.

Classrooms at both the Johnstown Road and Rudy Road locations chose countries for which to compete and then spent a week examining their country's geography, culture and agriculture.

They next staged an opening ceremony which included a parade of countries passing through Olympic arches. Olympic events followed, including bobsledding, skiing, ice skating, the luge, downhill sledding and hockey. All those participating received gold medals.

The overlap between the Early Childhood games and the televised Olympics in Sochi reportedly resulted in a surprising question by one child to his mother. "How did they know we were having the Olympics at our school?"

The green spot by Brenda Toney

"In the spring, at the end of the day, you should smell like dirt." -- Margaret Atwood

This spring, participants in FCBDD Adult Services and their partner agencies will have fun making

Margaret's words ring true. April starts the greening of raised bed gardens at Arc East and West as well as Bixby and Hague.

Other gardeners from FCBDD locations have been doing volunteer gardening at Hoover Educational Gardens, and farming raised beds at Franklin Park Conservatory. This project provides education in farming and nutrition, as well as a way to earn money and donate to the community.

"There's nothing more green than growing green," notes ARC West Director Jan Montgomery. All the plants grown in the gardens are grown without chemicals and with only natural methods of pest control. In addition, the seeds and seedlings planted are of the non-genetically modified variety. Nutrients are added to the soil naturally through composting. Weeds are eradicated by a combination of mulching and frequent weeding.

Much of the gardening success can be attributed to our partners in farming and distribution of food. A nonprofit organization dedicated to making healthy and sustainably grown food accessible, Local Matters has provided our gardens with seeds and seedlings, as well as providing education to our gardeners. In turn, we share our storage space with them.

Produce from the gardens is sold to Black Creek Bistro in Old Towne East . Herbs, such as thyme and basil, are grown for local bakery Bake Me Happy. ARC East contributes to the Gahanna Residents In Need food pantry. ARC West partners with the Clintonville Resource Center.

If eating delicious food and helping to feed the community isn't enough of an incentive to grow green, many ARC gardeners see benefits in mood. Spending time outside and digging in the dirt has had a decompressing effect on many participants. Gardening provides a creative outlet for others and a feeling of accomplishment.
