Board elects new officers

At its annual organizational meeting on January 22nd, the Franklin County Board of MRDD chose its leadership team for the coming year.

Jerry Saunders was elected President. Other officers elected were Helen Ninos, Vice President, and Dean Fadel, Secretary.

Mr. Saunders served as Vice President and Finance Committee Chairman in 2008. He is Chief Executive Officer and President of Africentric Personal Development Shop, Inc., and a member of the Columbus Recreation and Parks Commission.

Ms. Ninos served as Secretary and Human Resources Committee Chairwoman in 2008. She is employed as Director of Human Resources for Ohio Attorney General Richard Cordray, and formerly served as Chief Operating Officer of United Way of Central Ohio.

Mr. Fadel represents Franklin County on the Board of Trustees of the Ohio Association of County Boards of MRDD. He is a principal with the consulting firm, Public Affairs Advocates, and Vice President for Government Relations of the Ohio Insurance Institute.

Three new members of the Franklin County Board of MRDD took their seats on the panel on January 22nd. Lito Ramirez, Reneé Stein and Jean Williams were appointed by the Franklin County Commissioners. They will serve 4-year terms.

Mr. Ramirez is a strategic health care consultant specializing in physician referral revenue analysis. He is also a volunteer with the Down Syndrome Association of Central Ohio, helping with the organization's marketing efforts.

Mr. Ramirez resides in Dublin with his wife, Kathleen, and three children. Their youngest, Cal, aged 2, receives service coordination and early intervention services from FCBMRDD.

Ms. Stein has a background in business planning, marketing and management. She is the Business Manager for Ohio and Indiana for Bella Pictures.

Life, service of Jimmy Crum remembered

A voice familiar in central Ohio, especially in the disabilities community, will not be heard again. Jimmy Crum, sportscasting legend and champion of persons with disabilities, passed away at age 80 on January 5th.


Family and friends gathered January 10th at Jerome United Methodist Church in Plain City to celebrate Jimmy's life and his service to the community.

Jimmy was sports director and anchor at Channel 4 (WCMH-TV) from 1953 through 1993. He was the "voice of the basketball Buckeyes" from 1959 to 1979 and the "radio voice of the Cincinnati Bengals" from 1968 to 1980.

Jimmy was well known for his skillful reporting, outspoken opinions and exciting style of broadcasting. Few basketball viewers will ever forget such colorful expressions as "barn burner" and "cliff hanger," and "How about that, sports fans?"

He won many professional awards, including three Emmys. He was inducted into the Ohio Associated Press Broadcasters Hall of Fame. Yet, to central Ohioans, Jimmy was known as much for his community service as for his broadcasting.

For many years, Jimmy was President of Recreation Unlimited, the nonprofit provider of sports and camping programs to persons with disabilities. His involvement in the field began in 1959 when he met Dick Ruff, a Franklin County physical education instructor.


Jimmy delights the audience and former Board President, Ben Hale, at a roast in Ben's honor. Jimmy was the founding chairman of Ohio Special Olympics, and an active supporter of FCBMRDD. According to Superintendent Jed Morison, "Jimmy has always been there. He has chaired levy campaigns, supported fundraising events, arranged news coverage, encouraged volunteers, and helped families in need. He has been a true friend of persons with disabilities, and our agency."

For twenty-one years, Jimmy hosted Columbus' Easter Seals telethon. He also chaired the fundraising drive for Children's Hospital Burn Unit from 1974 through 1977.


It is estimated that Jimmy helped central Ohio charities raise over 30 million dollars.

How to avoid carbon monoxide poisoning

What are the symptoms?

The most common symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning are headache, dizziness, weakness, nausea, vomiting, chest pain and confusion. High levels of carbon monoxide ingestion can cause loss of consciousness and death. People who are sleeping or intoxicated can die from carbon monoxide poisoning before ever experiencing symptoms.

How does carbon monoxide poisoning work?

Red blood cells pick up carbon monoxide quicker than they pick up oxygen. If there is a lot of carbon monoxide in the air, the body may replace oxygen in blood with carbon monoxide. This blocks oxygen from getting into the body, which can damage tissues and result in death.

Who is at risk from carbon monoxide poisoning?

All people and animals are at risk for poisoning. Certain groups — unborn babies, infants and people with chronic heart disease, anemia or respiratory problems — are more susceptible to its effects.

How can I prevent poisoning in my home?

Have your heating system, water heater and any other gas, oil or coal-burning appliances serviced by a qualified technician every year. Do not use portable flameless chemical heaters indoors. Also, install a battery-

operated carbon monoxide detector in your home.

How can I heat my house safely or cook when the power is out?

Never use a gas range or oven for heating. This can cause a build-up of carbon monoxide in your home. Also, never burn charcoal indoors. Burning charcoal — red, gray, black or white — gives off carbon monoxide.

How can I avoid poisoning from my vehicle?

Have a mechanic check the exhaust system of your car every year. A small leak in your car's exhaust system can lead to a build-up of carbon monoxide inside the car. Never run a car or truck in the garage with the garage door shut. Carbon monoxide can build up quickly while your car or truck is running in a closed garage.

The systems will be installed in Creative Housing's Cooper Road Apartments, which are scheduled for completion in the fall of 2009.
