FCBDD helping provide risk-free ways to try remote support

Dateline

Families and people with developmental disabilities who want to learn more about the benefits of remote support have plenty of options for trial runs in Franklin County.

The Franklin County Board of Developmental Disabilities and other disability-services organizations are providing both information about remote support and opportunities to try it out - including an offer of free internet service for a year -- so that people can decide whether the technology is a good fit for them.

"And in the beginning, there is overlap allowed," said Critty Buenconsejo, president and CEO of Creative Housing/Creative Renovations. "You can still have your staff person there if you're uncomfortable. You don't have any increase her independence. risk in trying it."

FCBDD board member Marci Straughter says remote-support services allow her to safely

Following the Ohio Department of Developmental Disabilities, FCBDD recently adopted a "Technology First" policy for the agency. That means technology solutions are to be explored and documented during the service planning process, considered as the first option, and used to the greatest extent possible to meet the needs of those receiving services. No one, however, is required to choose remote services.

"There's so much that this can do – the possibilities are growing every day," said Tim Voigt, an FCBDD supervisor in the Service Coordination Department. "And it doesn't cost anything to find out."

Remote support, which is always combined with assistive technology, allows an off-site service provider to monitor and respond to health, safety and other needs using live, two-way communication - just like Skype or FaceTime - so that people can communicate with providers as needed. Advocates say it can increase privacy, reduce demand for onsite staff and, in some cases, improve overnight monitoring of medical conditions such as seizure activity.



Ohio At Home's remote-support monitors can quickly respond to health, safety and other needs.

People served by FCBDD and who have Level 1, IO or SELF Medicaid waivers are eligible to receive reimbursement for home internet services for up to one year if they try remote support for 60 days, at a minimum of eight hours per week.

"If you decide on day 61 that you no longer want it, we'll still pay for the internet for the year," Voigt said.

FCBDD board member Marci Straughter uses remote support as part of her service plan and says it helps her to feel safer and more confident about living on her own.

"You don't have to go big all at once," said Ali Rahimi of Ohio At Home, a local provider agency that offers remote support services. "Identify the need, and see where you could use the most help. Starting small is the key to success."

Not long after he hung up his cap and gown last year, Ryan Alimo headed off to a new day program. He had loved being at West Central School and was disappointed when the coronavirus pandemic stole some of his time there. Moving on - without his beloved teacher Miss Donna – was a big, slightly scary step.

But Ryan didn't miss a beat. "He absolutely loves it," his mom, Sheila Alimo, said of his activities at All R Friends in Gahanna. "The staff is wonderful. Honestly, I don't think he's ever been happier."

Students display their creative side at annual art show

More than 150 different works of art, from paintings to clay figures to video recordings, lined the walls and filled the halls at the FCBDD Early Childhood Learning Community. And kids had a blast showing family members their special creations.

Always an end-of-the-year hit, the annual Art Show was once again held inside the school. Because of the coronavirus pandemic, last year's event was a drive-through experience.

"The art show is a tradition that goes back many years," said Theri Brady, ECE creative arts specialist. "It's an important event for the school."

Each child contributes two pieces of artwork for display during the show. Some have been in progress throughout the year and relate to an ongoing theme or project in the classroom, such as ocean life, a bakery or bones. Teachers emphasize the process over the product, and children lead the way.

"It's always based on their intent. That's really important to us," said teacher and ECLC activity coordinator Gretchen Uhl.

The creativity of some students, for example, was displayed by way of video recording. Brady said staff members make sure children have the opportunity to express themselves in ways that work best for them, and that might mean playing a drum instead of drawing or sculpting.

"It's our job to make sure we can hear that voice," she said. "For Charlie, it's rhythm. Rhythm and music-making. He responds to that and he creates that. We need to make sure the world hears it."













Medicaid waiver changes set to go into effect this summer

The Ohio Department of Developmental Disabilities has adopted several changes to the Medicaid waivers it administers, including expanded options for self-directed transportation.

"People have been asking for changes for a long time," said Christine Brown, a member of the Self-Advocate Advisory Council for the Franklin County Board of Developmental Disabilities. "This makes it so the individual doesn't have to rely on staff to go somewhere, which is especially important since we have such a shortage of DSPs."

DODD has a web page and video to help explain the various changes to the Level One, SELF and Individual Options waivers that take effect July 1. According to the state, people with Medicaid waivers can use self-directed transportation in two ways:

- Through the purchase of prepaid vouchers, cards, passes or tokens for ground public transportation such as Uber, Lyft, buses and cabs.
- By enlisting a family member, neighbor or friend to transport them. The person providing the transportation can be approved through the Financial Management Services.

Self-directed transportation is available for employment, community activities including social events and volunteering, community-resource appointments, and for opportunities available in the broader community, such as going out to dinner or to a sports event.

Individuals and families should talk to their service coordinator about transportation needs so that information can be added to the individual service plan. For additional details, go to <u>dodd.ohio.gov/waivers-and-services/welcome</u>

She said her son's days are "nice and full," with plenty of activities, new friends and opportunities to work on various skills. Though Ryan is ready for down time when he gets home, he's always eager to go the next day. "Sometimes he's not real happy on holidays or days they're closed," Alimo said.

Jill Hicks, transition resources specialist at West Central, said teachers and therapists work to prepare students and families for the shift to adult services, whether that means employment, a day program or job development.

"We help with the process, completing what we call a discovery profile that includes a student's preferences, interests, needs and strengths," Hicks said. "We can pass on their routine, what kind of schedule they're on, activities they like. We have trial programs so they can see if the next program is a good fit. And then families decide what is best."

Ryan, 23, said he likes working on computer skills at All R Friends and enjoys the community outings, especially shopping and karaoke. And he hasn't lost his devotion to his favorite movie. "Mamma Mia!," he said. "I know all the words."

He also thinks often of Donna Tracy, a West Central teaching assistant who retired last year after 40 years with FCBDD. "I had a dream and Miss Donna was in it," Ryan said, smiling. "I love her."
