## Superintendent/CEO Jed Morison announces retirement

Jed Morison, Superintendent/CEO of the Franklin County Board of Developmental Disabilities, announced that he will retire on Dec. 31, 2023, after 54 years of public service.

He will remain on the job while the Board conducts a search and hires his replacement. Morison then plans to take several months of accumulated vacation time and will be available to the new superintendent during the transition.

His professional career began in 1969 at age 21 and included work as a school bus driver, counselor and direct-support professional, teacher and director of Ohio Special Olympics. Morison returned to FCBDD as assistant superintendent and was named superintendent in 2000. He also spent 14 years as a member of the Bexley City Council.



"I have had the good fortune to witness what I often call a civil rights movement for people with

disabilities," he said in a message to staff, friends and the community. "We have come a long way, now helping thousands of children and adults of all abilities and their families to live enjoyable, safe and meaningful lives."

## ARC opens spacious new day facility in Grove City

A vacant call center in Grove City has been transformed into a bright, welcoming and barrierfree space for adults with developmental disabilities.

ARC Industries recently held a ribbon-cutting ceremony for its new facility on Marlane Drive, which expects to provide active treatment and community-based services for about 75 people. A majority will be residents of the nearby Heinzerling Developmental Center who had been traveling to Groveport for day services.

"We realized there aren't a lot of providers in the area, especially those that can support people with complex needs," said Amanda Smith, chief services officer at ARC. "Now it's going to be a nine-minute commute for them – we timed it – instead of 25."

To reimagine the building, ARC leaders turned to their front-line employees. "We really worked closely with our staff – they know the needs of people best," she said. "From the beginning, they helped us pick the architect, they helped us pick the design team, the colors and even the paint."

"I'm so excited to see what this will provide for people with developmental disabilities in our community," said Jed Morison, Superintendent/CEO of the Franklin County Board of Developmental Disabilities. "It means a lot."

The building is focused on flexibility of space and a feel that is open, modern and filled with natural light. It has several private changing rooms, activity rooms and an outdoor sensory garden.

"It's a win-win for everyone," said CJ Clifford, habilitation specialist at Heinzerling. "The building is innovative and accessible. It's pretty much what human beings want – to be able to go outside, and to experience the outside when you're inside."

### **Return of FCBDD Provider Fair draws hundreds of families**

As she looked over the many positive comments on the Provider Fair visitor survey, Service Coordination Supervisor Anne Watson spotted one that seemed to represent "the hope of our efforts," she said.

"It was amazing! I laughed and cried!" the parent wrote. "The supports here made me feel like I CAN DO this."

Hundreds of area service providers, community resource groups, people with developmental disabilities and their family members filled the Lausche Building at the state fairgrounds on April 27 for an event that offers a rare opportunity for people to connect, talk, learn and ask questions in person.

"Sometimes you just don't want to communicate by website or email," one father said after spending a few hours at the event. "This was a very productive morning, and now, I've got a lot of good resources."

The Franklin County Board of Developmental Disabilities had not hosted a Provider Fair for the past three years due to the pandemic. Its return was a huge success, said Larry Macintosh, FCBDD Director of Administrative and Support Services. "For the first time ever, we filled up the entire building," he said.

Pedicabs provided rides both inside the cavernous building and in the parking lot. "It's a little overwhelming," parent Anjie Graber said. "But it really is nice to be able to meet people in person."

# Goodwill Columbus, Harmony Project team up for collaborative performance

As she stood before an audience that had swelled to more than 400 people, Lattie Harrington realized she wasn't feeling like her usual happy self. "I thought, 'Uh-oh, what just happened? It got me," she said. "I got stage fright. I cried a little bit."

But the tears didn't linger, and Harrington soon felt happy and proud to be among the Goodwill Columbus Work and Community Services (WCS) artists taking part in "Hear My Voice: The Goodwill Harmony Sessions."

The collaborative performance on April 26 featured powerful songs, storytelling, theater and rhythmic movement, along with a display of works by Goodwill Art Studio artists. Goodwill WCS Director Tiffany Martin said WCS has partnered with the nonprofit Harmony Project and We Amplify Voices, plus local storyteller Donte Woods-Spikes, for the past few years to bring inclusive, creative opportunities in the arts to people with developmental disabilities.

"It's all about giving them experiences they've never had," Martin said with a smile. "Even though she was nervous, Lattie often finds a way to give herself her own solo."

I was in the choir, in the rap session and in the heartbeat (drama therapy) with Joe.

So maybe your tears were actually happy ones – just lots of emotion all at once. I got a little scared when that light came on. My mom cried, too.

But once you settled down, did you enjoy it? Are you glad you've worked with groups like the Harmony Project and with We Amplify Voices to produce really cool songs?

Oh, yes. I love it! Now I'm on YouTube, Spotify and Apple. I'm a little bit of a star.

#### Sounds like you're up for more.

I've still got my Harmony t-shirt. I'm going to keep going. I practice all the time.

## Easterseals offers improv camp to help build social skills

Easterseals Central and Southeast Ohio is teaming up with The Improvaneer Method to offer summer "Improva-Camp" sessions for youth and adults with disabilities.

The Improvaneer Method was launched by Rob Snow, an Ohio parent who has a son with Down syndrome. Participants use improvisation to build skills such as quick and creative thinking, problem solving, adapting to change, listening, teamwork, self-confidence and more.

"Improv games is what they call them, but those games are working on all those social communication skills that are so Important," said Lisa McCarty, Director of Children's Programs at Easterseals.

McCarty has a teenage son with Down syndrome who took part in Improvaneer classes offered through the Down Syndrome Association of Central Ohio. "He loved it," she said.

Camps are broken into a youth group for ages 10 to 15 and adult sessions for those 16 and older. All take place over three days from June 26-28 and end with a performance and reception. Cost is \$175 per participant.

## ECE Partnership hosts touch-a-truck extravaganza

Hundreds of young children got to see the real-life version of some of their favorite toys at the recent touch-a-truck event at the FCBDD Early Childhood Education and Family Center.

"Our kids love vehicles – they just do," said Jessica Bennett, a Franklin County Board of Developmental Disabilities teacher who helped organize the event. "And we had the space here to allow kids to see them, touch them in a safe space, and to really bring the community in."

Bennett said the idea grew into an end-of-the-school-year celebration, including not just the trucks, but food, a resource table and even a costumed character. More than 380 people attended.

Children were able to explore 12 different vehicles, from fire and plow trucks to a postal delivery van and utility bucket truck. FCBDD and the Early Childhood Education Partnership are grateful for the support of the city of Columbus, the U.S. Postal Service, AEP Ohio and Rumpke.









## **Ohio Tech Ambassador Network coming to Columbus**

Families and people with disabilities who are interested in learning more about supportive and assistive technology are invited to a special event this month with the Ohio Tech Ambassadors.

From 1 to 4 p.m. on June 15, Tech Ambassadors from around the state will appear in person at the Ohio Statehouse to speak and to show some of the technology they use in their everyday lives.

George Myers, grant director for the Ohio Tech Ambassador Network, said the idea is to provide opportunities for upclose demonstrations and discussions in an open-house environment. Organizers will be giving away a new Echo Show 5 to a pre-registered person or family member present when the winner is announced.

The event also serves as a wrap-up celebration for the current phase of the Ohio Tech project, which since January 2021 has featured Ohio Tech Ambassadors serving as role models, hosting events and providing peer-to-peer mentoring to show how supportive technology can foster independence and enhance the lives of people with developmental disabilities.
