Franklin County DD introduces new logo

Starting this month, the Franklin County Board of Developmental Disabilities is rolling out a new logo.

Bold, bright hues of teal and gold show off an outline of the state, a star pinpointing our location in the Columbus area, and a shortened version of the agency's name: **Franklin County DD**.



"We hope it catches on," Superintendent/CEO Dot Yeager said. "Our full name is a mouthful, and there really hasn't been an acronym that is both easy to say and that makes our identity clear."

Officially and legally, the agency name remains the same. Franklin County DD is one we'll use more casually and conversationally, with an aim toward boosting public awareness of our mission to promote inclusion and accessibility for children and adults with developmental disabilities.

Since 2009, the Franklin County DD logo has been based on a pencil-drawn montage of faces by renowned artist Martha Perske. She began creating her lifelike drawings of people with disabilities in the early 1970s to illustrate newsletters and books written by her husband, the late Robert Perske, a chaplain and a passionate advocate for the rights of people with developmental disabilities.

"I love the history of it, but younger families might not relate as much," Gary Tonks, President of the Arc of Ohio, said of the Perske logo. "We know that a lot of disabilities are invisible, especially autism."

Tonks knew Mr. Perske well and says the drawings, like the couple's work, always were meant to promote acceptance and inclusion. And for many families at the forefront of the disability-rights movement, the so-called "Perske prints" resonated. "For our older generation, it's an acceptance of who your child is and that it's okay," Tonks said. "The pictures are everywhere."



It will take a while for Franklin County DD to update or replace existing signage with the new logo, which is much easier to reproduce than the highly detailed Perske drawing. Documents, business cards and online changes will happen sooner.

When Franklin County DD began using the Perske logo, Ohio had just changed state law to remove the words *mental retardation* from the names of county boards. Prior to that, the agency's logo design showed the letters "FCBMRDD" between horizontal, parallel lines.

The name change was a victory for self-advocates, including many in Franklin County. "Let's hope that attitudes continue to shift," former Superintendent/CEO Jed Morison said at the time, so that communities "consider the person first rather than the disability."

Franklin County DD welcomes new MUI manager

Eric Horvath, an experienced investigator who spent more than 27 years with Franklin County Probate Court, recently joined Franklin County DD to lead the agency's MUI Department.

He and the MUI team also are moving from Service Coordination oversight and will report to Legal Counsel Gwynn Kinsel. "Any internal investigative arm of an agency should have some separation," Kinsel said. "It just makes sense for MUI to be under Legal."

MUI, an acronym that refers to a Major Unusual Incident involving a person served by Franklin County DD, is a high-volume department that handles more than 1,500 reports each year. Incidents vary widely, from abuse and neglect to unexpected hospitalizations and accidents.

"I look forward to bringing a fresh set of eyes to how we conduct investigations," said Horvath, who began his new job on Nov. 29. "Part of my training right now is to sit back and listen and learn, and everyone has been so gracious."

Franklin County DD Superintendent/CEO Dot Yeager noted that, while at Probate Court, Horvath and his investigators routinely collaborated with Franklin County DD, the ADAMH Board of Franklin County, the Central Ohio Area Agency on Aging, APSI (Advocacy and Protective Services, Inc.) and several law enforcement agencies.

"Eric brings lots of knowledge and experience," Kinsel said. "We had a great working relationship in the past, and we're very happy to have him here at our agency."

A Columbus native, Horvath lives in the Eastmoor area with his wife, daughter and son. He said he loves the idea of building on his public-service career while leading a team that deals directly with Franklin County residents with developmental disabilities.

"We're all in this together as a community," he said. "Looking out for each other, and our neighbors, is important."



In memoriam: Franklin County DD staff member Yaw Osei

Friends and colleagues are remembering Yaw Osei, a former IT specialist who became a much-loved and respected member of the Franklin County DD Information Technology Department. Osei died in a car accident on Nov. 22.

"He was the nicest, most humble person you could ever meet," said IT Director Travis Sherick. "If he had a million problems going on, you'd never know it. Yaw was all about serving others."

Osei started out as a consultant to the agency and had been a full-time information technology specialist for nearly five years. Because the majority of his work was done through the IT service desk, he interacted with hundreds of his Franklin County DD colleagues.

Though computer snags and problems are often frustrating, the customer experience with Osei was always the opposite. "Even if Yaw couldn't resolve the issue right away, customers walked out of there feeling heard," Sherick said.



Osei, 63, is survived by his children and by his wife. He was celebrated during a memorial service on Dec. 20.

Dozens of people contacted the IT Department with kind words, thoughts and cards after Osei's passing. Sherick and others said Osei taught by example. "The thing I hope to incorporate is his humbleness, and to learn when to slow down," Sherick said. "Yaw took on anything that was asked of him, and he did it in such a calm, thoughtful way. He was reliable, and had so much integrity."
